From 10:30am – 12:00 noon, for those who are comfortable coming to the church, you may do so. The first option is to stay in your car. Deacons and others will be standing six feet apart along the sidewalk on Jefferson St. with their masks on. You can pull up and roll down your window and, wearing your mask, catch up with your deacon, who will remain six feet away.

Also from 10:30am – 12:00 noon, for those who are comfortable coming into the church (six feet apart and with masks), we will open the building for all to see the many changes that have taken place while we've been separated. Likely we'll put on the air conditioning, so you won't just see but feel – the difference! And by then there is a good chance the work in the Gathering Place will be done! From 12:00 on, for those who are not comfortable going out, we have a group of folks who are willing to come see you! If you would prefer a visit, someone will come to your door, knock or ring, and then retreat so you can have a safe and spirited conversation. And they will hand deliver your gift! For those who are not comfortable interacting in these ways, we extend complete understanding – and another option. If that is the case, we will put your gift in the mail so everyone will be a part of

"My life goes on in endless song, above earth's lamentations,

I see Mahalia Jackson, Elvis Presley, One Hour of Relaxing Hymns on Piano, Orchestral Arrangements—some of these sights have the lyrics, and you can sing right along with them (being safe, of course).
- 2—Watch, listen to, and join in for our recorded services. We send out a weekly recorded service with hymns and special music—watch and listen to it each week. Our dedicated choir members are stepping up and providing music as safely as possible. We're also taking submissions for a virtual Jeremiah's Coffee House—you can record any talent/interest you have and send it to my email—remember, our "songs" come in many forms—keep expressing yourself and keep being heard.
- 3—Sing somewhere every day, whether it's in your home, your back yard, your car—wherever you find yourself that you are alone and not contributing to "super-spreading" just sing—it will lift your spirit! And if you can't sing, you can hum or whistle! Even as we wait we can joyously sing an endless Alleluia!

BUILDING IMPROVEMENTS

from

The Gathering Place Group

Lots of stuff has been happening in the Hanover Church building since the July/August Herald. You have seen glimpses of the progress through the weekly Flash messages. The underground plumbing was installed in the Gathering Place and the new concrete floor was poured. The walls are up for the new food pantry and the new bathrooms and the custodian's closet. Electrical work is almost complete and wall tile is being installed in the bathrooms. New steps have been installed on the Baynard side of the Gathering Place. Money has been saved because we did not have to remove as much concrete as we anticipated and we did not have to bring in crushed stone for the base. With the money saved, we plan to install a new tile floor throughout the Gathering Place, rather than only in the location when the concrete was replaced. Work is moving forward close to the schedule estimated by the contractor.

The new fire main was installed for the sprinkler system in the gym, but the Fire Marshall's Office refused to issue permits for the sprinkler system and the new fire panel. Work came to a halt, while we obtained new architectural drawings. Negotiations have continued and there is some good news. On Thursday, August 27th, Comprehensive Fire Technologies received a permit to install the new fire panel and associated warning systems. We have yet to receive a permit for the sprinkler system, but we are hopeful that will happen soon. Stay tuned! ~ Ellen Casson





Hanover Food Pantry

The Food Pantry has been a busy place this month. Not as busy as earlier in the summer, but still quite a few clients have been by. We average 30 families each week. Our clients certainly are grateful that they can come to Hanover and receive a friendly greeting and food for their family. We are so appreciative of the support we get from our Hanover family and other churches and individuals. As the coordinator of this outreach, I am very thankful for our volunteers who come each week and provide those greetings! They are a dedicated group and they keep our food pantry running efficiently and safely. Our hours of operation are Thursdays from 8-10a.m. Physical distancing, masks and gloves are required. We are all looking forward to the time when we can get located in our "new digs" in the Gathering Place, but for now we are doing very nicely in the Social Hall and outside on the sidewalk. Donations are always appreciated – canned vegetables, pasta, spaghetti sauce, tuna, canned meats, rice and soups are great. ~ Becky Arnold

August Financial Update...

The finance committee met on August 12. We reviewed the financial report for July 2020, showing we received \$95,578 in combined pledged and non-pledged giving, which is 58 percent of the budgeted amount of \$205,000, at 58 percent of the year. Per capita giving is \$847, approximately 22% of what we budgeted for (\$3,800) in per capita payments and 16% of what Hanover pays in per capita for the year (\$5,275). Per capita is \$29.80 per member per year. Every donation helps, in case you have forgotten about your per capita dues. Our regular income at the end of July 2020 (\$149,970) was exceeded by our expenses (\$178,481) by \$28,511. The Hanover balance sheet shows \$110,992 in total equity.

The finance committee also reviewed property expenditures that will exceed the budgeted amount in the education wing property line. We have \$3,500 budgeted and two unexpected expenses. The compressor for the 2-door commercial freezer had to be replaced (approx. \$2,400) and Delaware State Licensing required some lead paint abatement (approx. \$2,100). In addition, expected expenses of approximately \$2,000 are necessary to replace a motor, and complete other repairs to the two air conditioning units cooling the childcare center.

We also reviewed the donations and grants, expenses and expenditures related to the capital improvements continuing in the Hanover building. Donations and foundation grants of \$357,114 were raised by Jefferson Street Center and individual gifts of \$249,413 were received from Hanover members and friends. An extraordinary total of \$606,527 was raised. The total expenditure for installation of our air conditioning was \$179,675. That includes electrical, carpentry, architect, roofing and AC units. Of that amount, Hanover donations equaled \$168,613 and JSC contributed a \$10,000 grant received for the air conditioning in the gym. The Gathering Place kitchen was renovated at a cost of \$36,273, all of which came from foundation grants and one individual donation to JSC. Work continues on the Gathering Place food pantry, the new ADA compliant bathrooms, and the gym sprinkler and fire safety system.

The finance committee will meet again September 23 to begin to focus on a budget for 2021. 
