A Hope-filled Hanover Advent



The lighting of the Advent candles each Sunday in Advent is a Hanover tradition. The first candle is the candle of Hope. Have you ever wondered why Christians light the Hope candle at the beginning of Advent. What is it about Hope that it's the candle that is lit all four Sundays in Advent? Putting our hope in Jesus informs the other 3 pillars of our advent ~ Peace, Joy, and Love. Abiding in hope, we can work towards peace, be filled with joy, and share God's love.

This Advent, Sunday Discipleship classes will be focusing on hope: Hearing Hope, Seeing Hope, Sharing Hope, Proclaiming Hope. Our study guide describes

hope as "the spiritual practice of waiting in faith for the promises we know God will keep through Jesus Christ. Hope is not a fleeting feeling or a flimsy wish. Hope is grounded in God's faithfulness to God's people. Hope is threefold: a personal spiritual practice, a practice we share in community, and an evangelistic effort that we proclaim into the world. As Christians, we live lives full of abundant hope." We will HEAR that our HOPE comes from God, SEE HOPE through the birth and life of Jesus Christ, SHARE HOPE by loving others, and PROCLAIM HOPE to everyone, everywhere. Watch our weekly *The Scoop* for ways to engage in our weekly lessons at home or to prepare for our in-person sessions on Sunday mornings at 9:30am. Wondering Friends will watch the Holy Moly Advent videos and discuss and explore where they see hope in the story leading up to Jesus's birth.



The Christmas Joy Special Offering will be received on Sunday, December 18. The offering is shared equally by the Assistance Program of the Board of Pensions and by Presbyterian-related schools and colleges serving racial and ethnic minority students. The Assistance Program serves current and retired pastors and other church-employed persons who are in financial need.

For nearly 140 years, Presbyterian racial and ethnic colleges have been developing leadership for the denomination and for our racial/ ethnic congregations.

Faith in Action is offering **UnGifts** again this year. **UnGifts** began in 2006 and enables you to give someone the gift of a donation to an organization that is making a difference in our community or the wider world. We provide a gift card and an insert that describes the project, which you can give to the person in whose honor you made the donation. We will be offering UnGifts after church in December. You can pay by cash or check in person. Here are this year's choices:



Supporting Kidds' mission is "to provide a compassionate pathway to healing for grieving children and their families, and to empower the community to support them in the grieving process." Targeted and comprehensive support is given to grieving children and their families in New Castle County. This includes individual and group counseling for children and teens to help them adjust to the loss of a parent or sibling, both at the Center and in schools.

The Delaware Nature Society connects people with the natural world to improve our environment through education, conservation, and advocacy, by safeguarding clean water, modeling sustainable and regenerative farming, preserving land, encouraging the planting of native plants, planting trees, and providing education through classes, field trips and camps.

Friendship House unites people facing homelessness with loving, supportive communities they can call home. They do this through Empowerment Centers, a Winter Program, a Transitional Housing Program, a Clothing Bank and a Financial Assistance Program. It has served the community for more than 35 years. With the support of volunteers, donors, community partners, and faith partners, it helps more than 12,000 people each year.

Guatamala Stove Project funds the construction of masonry cook stoves for hundreds of thousands of people in Guatemala who continue to cook indoors over an open fire or rudimentary stove producing smoke that pours into the room and contributes to a wide range of chronic illnesses and health impacts such as early childhood pneumonia, emphysema, lung cancer, bronchitis, cardiovascular disease and low birth weight. The stove vent the smoke outdoors, and conserve wood. The stoves help relieve poverty, improve the well-being of disadvantaged people in Guatemala, and save trees. This is a NCC Presbytery Program.

Doctors without Borders provides independent, impartial medical **and** humanitarian assistance to the people who need it most. It cares for people affected by conflict, disease outbreaks, natural and human-made disasters, and exclusion from health care. They are active in more than 70 countries including Gaza, Sudan, Palestine, Israel, and Ukraine.

HANOVER MOVIE & DISCUSSION SUNDAY, JANUARY 21, 2024

Please join us after church for a viewing and discussion of "Philomena." The movie is based on the true story of an elderly Irish woman searching for the son who was put up for adoption against her will. In 1952, Irish teenager Philomena (Judi Dench) became pregnant out of wedlock and was sent to a convent where she worked unpaid.



When her baby, Anthony, was a toddler, the nuns took him away from her and put him up for adoption in the United States. For the next 50 years, she searched tirelessly for her son. When former BBC correspondent Martin Sixsmith (Steve Coogan) learns of the story, he becomes her ally and they travel together to America to try to find Anthony. The movie also touches on spiritual matters and makes a distinction between faith and institutionalized piety. The movie was nominated for four Academy Awards, including Best Picture, and won a BAFTA Award.
