Discipleship Classes

Both Discipleship classes are continuing their study of the Lord's Prayer. The discussions in the Adult Discipleship classes have been lively and have shaken us out of our complacency when praying this prayer. Praying The Lord's Prayer is not for the faint-hearted and we need to get back to praying it with our minds, hearts, hands and feet. Adam Hamilton in his book, The Lord's Prayer: The Meaning and Power of the Prayer Jesus Taught, reminds us that "in praying this prayer we not only fix our hearts and minds on God's kingdom coming, but we also invite God to use us as instruments to fulfill our prayer. We're praying, in part, "Here I am, Lord, use me." Each Sunday morning Bea and George lead the adult class in a responsive reading based on the Lord's Prayer. The litanies are a wonderful way to introduce the portion of the prayer being discussed each week. For week 2 of our study, this was the litany:

Thy Kingdome Come, Thy will be Done...

Reader 1: On this day, we come into the presence of our God, praying with our Savior as he taught us to pray: People: Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name; your kingdom come, your will be done on earth as it is in heaven.

Reader 2: We join with Christians around the world as we say:

People: May your kingdom come!

Reader 1: To those who are poor,

Reader 2: to those who are hungry,

People: May your kingdom come!

Reader 1: To those who despair,

Reader 2: to those who weep,

People: May your kingdom come!

Reader 1: To those who long for peace,

Reader 2: to those who are in the midst of war

People: May your kingdom come!

Reader 1: Help us to work for the coming of your kingdom.

Reader 2: Much is broken, yet we work for renewal, for justice, and for peace.

People: Your will be done on earth as it is in heaven.

Reader 1: Use us as your instruments.

Reader 2: Help us to see the possibilities before us.

People: Your will be done on earth as it is in heaven.

Reader 1: Give us vision so that our work may be part of the coming of your kingdom.

Reader 2: Give us the courage to do what you ask of us.


People: Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name; your kingdom come, your will be done on earth as it is in heaven.


~Praying the Lord's Prayer During Lent by Robert J. and Laura Keeley

"Philomena" - Now Showing March 24

We will be watching and discussing "Philomena" on Sunday, March 24, immediately following worship. This movie is based on the true story of an elderly Irish woman searching for the son who was put up for adoption against her will. In 1952, Irish teenager Philomena (Judi

Dench) became pregnant out of wedlock and was sent to a convent where she worked unpaid.

When her baby, Anthony, was a toddler, the nuns took him away from her and put him up for adoption in the United States. For the next 50 years, she searched tirelessly for her son. When former BBC correspondent Martin Sixsmith (Steve Coogan) learns of the story, he becomes her ally and they travel together to America to try to find Anthony. The movie also touches on spiritual matters and makes a distinction between faith and institutionalized piety. The movie was nominated for four Academy Awards, including Best Picture, and won a BAFTA Award.

HELP DECREASE PLASTIC WASTE WITH ECOPLASTICS

According to an article in Smithsonian Magazine, the US generates about 40 million tons of plastic waste each year. About 85% (34 million tons) of this ends up either in landfills or in the ocean causing tremendous problems.



There are several things we can do to help. Lobby manufacturers to reduce plastic packaging; buy items that aren't packaged in plastic; use reusable containers; use refillable water bottles; use refillable containers for lunches or when taking home leftovers from a restaurant. Finally, you can bring your clean and dry #2, #4, #5 plastic and plastic bags to Hanover. They will be taken to EcoPlastics where they will be recycled into useful items. We will be taking our next donation to EcoPlastics on March7th. Please make the effort to bring your plastic to Hanover before then and keep it out of the landfill.

For 75 years, One Great Hour of Sharing has provided Presbyterians a way to share God's love with our neighbors in need around the world. Millions of people lack access to sustainable food sources, clean water, sanitation, education, and opportunity.

The three programs supported by One Great Hour of Sharing - Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, the Presbyterian Hunger Program, and Self-Development of People - all work in different ways to serve individuals and communities in need. From initial disaster response to ongoing community development, their work fits together to provide people with safety, sustenance, and hope.

Our donations go a long way to help. We will pass out special envelopes for the next two weeks and will collect during worship on Palm Sunday, March 24.

Here are the results of Faith in Action's UnGifts program in 2023.

Supporting Kidds' provides a "compassionate pathway to healing for grieving children and their families, and to empower the community to support them in the grieving process." Targeted and comprehensional their families and their families are the families are their families are the families



sive support is given to grieving children and their families in New Castle County. This includes individual and group counseling for children and teens to help them adjust to the loss of a parent or sibling. Donations = \$355

The Delaware Nature Society connects people with the natural world to improve our environment through education, conservation, and advocacy, by safeguarding clean water, modeling sustainable and regenerative farming, preserving land, encouraging the planting of native plants, planting trees, and providing education through classes, field trips and camps. Donations = \$265

Friendship House unites people facing homelessness with loving, supportive communities they can call home. They do this through Empowerment Centers, a Winter Program, a Transitional Housing Program, a Clothing Bank and a Financial Assistance Program. It has served the community for more than 35 years, with the support of volunteers, donors, community partners, and faith partners and helps more than 12,000 people annually. Donations = \$230

Guatamala Stove Project funds the construction of masonry cook stoves for hundreds of thousands of people in Guatemala who cook indoors over an open fire or rudimentary stove that pours smoke into the room and contributes to health problems such as early childhood pneumonia, lung cancer, and bronchitis. The stoves vent the smoke outdoors and conserve wood because they are much more efficient. The sturdy construction has a tiled surface for eating along the sides, providing a warm place for the family to gather to eat on cold mountain evenings. Donations =\$610

Doctors without Borders provides independent, impartial medical humanitarian assistance to the people who need it most. It cares for people affected by conflict, disease outbreaks, natural and human-made disasters, and exclusion from health care. They are active in more than 70 countries including Gaza, Sudan, Palestine, Israel, and Ukraine. Donations = \$200

Total Donations = \$1660

2023 Finance Highlights

The year-end review of 2023 shows we received \$187,088 from our pledged and unpledged gifts to Hanover. We received \$146,711 in pledges and \$40,377 in unpledged donations, which are donations received on a regular basis, but without a pledge commitment. This is 91% of the budgeted amount (\$205,000) approved for the 2023 fiscal year. This is a strong sign of support from our members and friends, during another challenging year, as we moved forward without a regular pastor for 7 months of 2023.



Other income highlights include:

Rent & Other Bldg Use \$ 9,961 (Pacem in Terris, Let's Play, Sharon Temple, Other)

Our "regular income" of \$275,354 is less than our budgeted amount of \$287,639, by about \$12,000. Regular income does not include restricted donations for the food pantry and other designated programs or special offerings. Restricted income totaled \$41,921. Special offering income was \$3,431.

Our expenses were \$260,365, which is about \$4,200 less than we budgeted for (\$264,589). Good news: our income exceeded our expenses by \$10,765. Expense highlights include:

\$ 23,665 in utilities and telephone/Internet

\$ 22,574 for insurance (property and liability)

\$164,561 in personnel costs

Hanover continues to have stock investments in a Fidelity investment fund. The value fluctuates daily, but the 2023 year-end statement showed a total of \$212,659. This reflects approximately \$32,000 in growth from an all-time low of approximately \$180,000 at the beginning of the year. Included in the total fund figure is a money market account of approximately \$32,000.

Hanover's finance committee includes Ellen Casson (Chair), Tim Arnold, Bill Tudor, Ray Kirkpatrick, Bill Balascio and Amy Harris (Treasurer).

Property News

In the February Herald, we mentioned that the stage in the Gathering Place is getting a facelift. The funding for this renovation is provided by Jefferson Street Center. Progress has been made. The stage has been extended approximately 34 inches. We have a new bulkhead and new steps. Painting is making the stage background more versatile for a variety of uses. Doors have been installed in the front of the stage, so we can use the space under the stage for much needed storage. Bill Tudor and Herman Pulliam have a clever idea to repurpose some of the heavy old Hanover tables into rolling carts to hold other tables and chairs and slide them under the stage. We look forward to adding a new projector, screen, lighting and a sound system, and seeing many community events and activities taking place in that space.



The property committee has been working on replacing light bulbs in the sanctuary. Not only do we want the lighting to be improved so we can all see better, but we also want the quality of the lighting, the warmth (Kelvin rating) and the brightness (Lumens), to be appropriate for the space. LED lighting is very different from the incandescent lighting we used to have, and as bulbs have been changed over time, there have been various types used in the fixtures in the sanctuary. This is a complicated job and we are not finished, but we did succeed in making the sanctuary much brighter for our Gospel Vespers event. We are also exploring replacing an old timer that used to operate lights to illuminate the large chancel window so it can be seen from the outside at night.
