## **Compassionate Grief Support**

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Another one of the hats I wear is that of being a certified coach for end-of-life care and relationship loss. I walk beside people who are dying, and their loved ones; I also walk beside people who are having a difficult time ending any type of relationship.

I have come to terms with the inevitability of death for all living things and beings. Actually, I was forced to. Either I had to shift my perspective about death or lose my mind. I have cared for my dying grandparents, parents, siblings, best friends, and so many church members and their families over this 35 -year journey. For me, death is the pathway to new beginnings.

One of the things that death has taught me is to treasure every single moment of my life and the people I care about. Grief can be debilitating and as Americans, we are not very good at helping people grieve and mourn. We tend to avoid conversations about death and the grieving process. We have been conditioned to pretend that death will bypass us.

Of course, death can be painful, tragic, and untimely, but avoidable it is not. When my 18-month-old niece died suddenly, I wasn't sure whether I would be able to officiate her funeral service without breaking down in tears, and while I still mourn her death, God's grace continues to see our family through.

I have become acutely aware of how grief is impacting congregations. So much continues to change rapidly around us and among us. Members are aging and losing the ability to do the things they once enjoyed, members pass away, pastors are retiring, and the effort to get younger families in the church is not moving along as quickly as we'd like.

What we continue to hear is how things must change for the church to survive, and while that is true, change is another form of loss, and loss is what we resist more than the thought of changing.

We must allow ourselves space to grieve the losses that are happening in our lives. It is not healthy to add more tasks to our daily routines to distract us from what might be demanding attention inside of us. The church must be the place where we can be our most human selves.

When relationships end, that is also a type of loss. I am still grieving the loss of some of the relationships that I had with former parishioners for over 11 years. True love never ends suddenly.

We all respond to and experience grief differently; and grief has no set time limits. The anger, fear, depression, frustration, or sadness does not end in the sanctuary or at the cemetery. Expressing grief is not a sign of weakness, but a way to learn to live with loss.



With Eco Plastic Recycling: Please bring your plastic to Hanover to be recycled at Eco Plastic Products. Why? Our collection of clean and dry number 2, number 4, and number 5 plastic and plastic bags seems to have slowed down. It is more important than ever that we continue to bring our plastic to Hanover to be recycled at Eco Plastic Products where it will be made into useful items. Today, the US manufactures more than 438 million tons of new plastic every year. Plastic seriously harms ecosystems when it leaks into the environment. This includes physical impacts such as animals getting entangled in or ingesting plastic, chemical harm caused by hazardous additives in plastic products, and biological damage through plastic particles that are found everywhere, even inside human organs.

Of all the plastic waste we generate globally, scientists estimate that less than 10 percent is recycled. The OECD found that **only about 60% of the plastic put in recycle bins was actually able to be recycled**. Please make the extra effort to save your number 2, number 4, and number 5 plastic and plastic bags. Every little bit helps to keep plastic out of our environment and to protect God's creation.

### **Female Harmony Society Receives Award**



At the luncheon two organizations were recognized, The Female Harmony Society and the Fund for Women. The Female Harmony Society received a plaque reading:

In recognition of your support of reentry support services to assist justice-involved women.



2024 Congresswoman Lisa Blunt Rochester spoke at the luncheon. She shared some of her personal struggles as a woman and a widow. She emphasized how much harder it is for a woman who has been in prison. She is working to get a "Clean Slate" bill passed in Congress so that a criminal record doesn't have to be noted when applying for a job, health care, etc. We can be proud that Delaware already has such a law.

### Faith In Action's Spring Event

It's a story about the challenges of parenting, love, family and acceptance. It is also the story of young Claude, the youngest of Rosie & Penn's five children, who has gender dysphoria and wants to be a girl. It's a novel about reservations, transformations, and secrets.

While Frankel is the mother of a transgender child, the story is fictional. She feels, "This is how it always is: Change is always hard and miraculous and hard again; parenting is always a leap into the unknown with crossed fingers and full hearts; children grow but not always according to plan. And families with secrets don't get to keep them forever."
