

Toni Morrison's The Bluest Eye (A banned book)

Please join us for our book discussion on Sunday, September 22, **2024**. More and more we are hearing that books are being challenged or banned, so we will be reading a book that has been banned many times, The Bluest Eye by Toni Morrison. Morrison's first novel takes place in the author's hometown of Lorain, Ohio around 1940 and tells the story of black, eleven-year-old Pecola Breedlove who wants lighter skin and blue eyes so that she will be beautiful and loved like all the blond, blue-eyed children she knows. Pecola lives in an abusive household with an alcoholic father and parents who fight constantly. She wants her life to change, but when change does come, Pecola faces adversity and pain. As the book jacket says, "(This) novel asks powerful questions about race, class, and gender with the subtlety and grace that characterize Morrison's writing." In discussing the book we'll discuss why we think it was banned, and assuming we disagree, why it shouldn't be. Two copies of the book are available in the church office. Please plan to join us as the more people we have in the discussion, the more insight we all receive.

Caring for God's Creation

We talk a lot about caring for God's creation and we can get ideas by reading the Scoop each week. Another way is to think about how what we buy affects the earth. We can buy native plants. We can buy produce that's not wrapped in plastic. We can carry a refillable water bottle, rather than buy bottled water. One small way I've found is to use things made from bamboo. This includes towels, clothing, toilet "paper", disposable towels, and tissues.



The World Wildlife Fund estimates that over 27,000 trees are cut down each day to make toilet paper. Forest loss and damage is the cause of around 10% of global warming and when forests are cut down, it can have a devastating impact on the environment. Animals lose their homes, air and water quality can be affected, and greenhouse gases are released.

Bamboo on the other hand is a grass, not a tree. It grows incredibly quickly, making it sustainable. By switching to bamboo toilet paper, we can help to protect our forests.

If you'd like to try bamboo toilet "paper," pick up a free roll in the container by the bins for donating plastic to EcoPlastics.
