## **JSC Executive Director Honored**

We are proud of Amanda August, Executive Director of Jefferson Street Center! She is one of 40 "achievers and innovators" under 40 years of age honored by the Delaware Business Times at its annual DBT40 awards ceremony.

The annual 40 under 40 award is a competitive process and the honorees range in age from 25 to 39. The honorees are diverse, including small business owners, lawyers, scientists, members of law enforcement and government entities, and directors of nonprofits. All have contributed to public service in a variety of different ways.

Amanda is the first in her family to earn a bachelor's degree and a master's degree, the latter focused on community organizing and social justice. Prior to being hired as the first executive director for JSC, she worked as a case manager for Wilmington's West End Neighborhood House, assisting children aging out of foster care. Hired in April of 2021 as a part-time executive director, Amanda has grown JSC to three fulltime employees in just a little over three years! In addition to growing the Community Hub at Hanover, JSC is working with external partners on new initiatives that benefit the neighborhoods surrounding Hanover.

Many of the prayers that will be included, have been adapted in part from the book, <u>The New Social Awakening</u> Published by Westminster John Knox Press, of the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. You are encouraged to submit prayers as well.

#### Why Prayer?

We pray for our nation because we are instructed and encouraged by scripture to pray.

Colossians 4:2 "Devote yourselves to prayer being watchful and thankful."

1<sup>st</sup> John 5:14 "This is the confidence we have in approaching God, that if we ask anything according to God's will, God will hear us."

Psalm 145:18 "The Lord is near to all who will call on God in truth."

2<sup>nd</sup> Chronicles 7:14 "If my people who are called by my name shall humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear from heaven and will forgive their sin and will heal their land."

## Why so much emphasis on prayer now?

Because we are living in a time when Christian people are called to be prophetic. We are living in a fearful time. a time that threatens authoritarian rule, a time of intensifying global warming, a time of radical polarization, a time of violent partisanship, a time of great illusion and mean spiritedness, a time that threatens civil war and World War III. Oh Lord, in the midst of an increasingly complex, diverse, and morally challenging world, we are called to a sustained practice of personal and shared prayer. Together we pray for the heart and will to enter into discernment in order to be a more faithful presence in the life of the wider society. God, our Loving Creator, move within us, among us, beneath us and beyond us. In this period of holy history, in the degradation of both soils and souls, you invite us and call us, again and again, to be your people whole and holy; to live in alignment with your truth, your justice, and your love. So, we humbly pray for forgiveness and for the courage to respond to your calling because we long at the deep core of our souls to become again and again a more faithful people. Help us therefore, to reclaim the power of prayer so that we might respond with a sense of urgency to your call. Amen.

## Member Profile: Rick Bayard

In 2001, following years of working with members of the congregation on neighborhood improvement projects, Richard Bayard joined Hanover Church.

Rick chaired the Session's Property Committee and subsequently the Personnel Committee. Under Rick's leadership, the Personnel Committee responded to three major staff changes. (1) Joanne Hench was installed as Director of Music. (2) Volunteers were recruited to cover and manage the church office, eliminating a

staff position. (3) During the first half of 2006, the Committee guided the congregation through a time of transition in pastoral leadership. He met his future wife, Nancy Anderson Libby, and they married in June 2006.

Rick received a BA degree from Franklin and Marshall College, a Bachelor of Divinity degree from Eden Seminary, and a Master of City Planning degree from the University of Pennsylvania. He was ordained in 1960; served as Assistant Pastor of St John's UCC in Richmond, Va; and as Pastor of Good Shepherd UCC in Glen Burnie, Md. Following his pastoral service, Rick worked as Director of Long-Range Planning for the City of Wilmington. Then, as Executive Director of Brandywine Gateway Neighbors, a community corporation which spearheaded housing rehabilitation in the neighborhoods surrounding Hanover Church.

In retirement, Rick and Nancy moved to The Landings, a coastal community on Skidaway Island just south of Savannah, Georgia. They both enjoy boating; exploring faraway places while cruising; and, watching deer graze, alligators sunbathe, mockingbirds cry, and blue herons fish at the lagoon adjacent to their house. Rick helps neighbors maintain their homes. Nancy has become an accomplished needlework 'stitcher'. Both enjoy showing their friends the joys of living in the Savannah area.

More Light's mission has always been to empower and equip people and congregations to live into More Light has developed interrelated programs to move their welcome for all people. congregations along a pathway towards full inclusion, improve ministry services for LGBTQIA+ individuals in need, and expand the faith-based movement opposing discriminatory legislation. Our own Rev. Brooke Scott serves on the Board of Directors.



Matthew 25 is a movement through the PC-USA Presbyterian Mission. Matthew 25 is an invitation to live out the message in Matthew 25: 31-46, which is the parable of the sheep and goats where Jesus makes clear, that what we do matters to God, and how we treat others is important to God. This program looks to build congregational vitality, dismantling structural racism, and eradicating systemic poverty. They also work on Climate Change, Gender Justice and Heteropatriarchy, and Militarism.

There are 1,208 PC-USA "Matthew 25" congregations world-wide, nine being

in Delaware. They are:

Presbyterian Church of Dover, Dover Georgetown Presbyterian Church, Georgetown Coolspring Presbyterian Church, Lewes New Covenant Presbyterian Church, Middletown Community Presbyterian Church, New Castle New Castle Presbyterian Church, New Castle Ocean View Presbyterian Church, Ocean View Westminster Presbyterian Church, Wilmington Hanover Presbyterian Church, Wilmington

The New Castle Presbytery is one of 85 Presbyteries that are part of Matthew 25.
