Masked Men Again?!

The photographs of masked men that I have recently seen on social media sites, has triggered the same deep disgust I felt the first time I saw footage of the Klan burning homes, lynching Black men, and using the symbol of a burning cross to justify their White supremist and White exceptionalist ideologies.

A feeling of generational harm washes over me as I witness these cowardly people descending on constructions sites, chasing migrants in fields, lurking in courthouse hallways, knocking on doors of homes, and surrounding cars.

Not long ago, it was with police dogs and water hoses that law officers terrorized. Today we see masked men wrestling men and women to the ground, jumping out of cars and chasing them. Today we watch as people are shoved into vans, detained unlawfully and sent off to prisons in other countries.

These masked men have shown up at elementary schools purporting to be working for the Department of Homeland Security. They say they are ICE agents, but no one knows, because just like before, they are not courageous enough to show their faces. This time however, they are sanctioned by a mad man who is in a position of power to pardon insurrectionists, criminals, and "insecure boys."

Who are these masked men behind the large, black or green pieces of cloth, or bandanas covering the entire face, save for the eyes. Were the insurrectionists pardoned in order to become the presidents lynch mob? There is something particularly menacing about being attacked by faceless people. The mask not only terrorizes the victim of the attack, but it also uniquely empowers the perpetrator.

This country has a unique history with the particular terror of masked attackers. The Ku Klux Klan terrorized Black people in the American South in the first years after the end of the Civil War and through much of the 20th century.

So rampant was Klan violence in the years immediately after the Civil War, that it threatened to derail the promise of the 14th Amendment, which was ratified in 1868 and was designed to ensure that Black people would be equal citizens in post-Civil War America.

We have every right to know the identity of the officers who are abducting migrants and U.S. citizens from our streets. Officers of the state should be proud to identify themselves as such. When they are not, it is a warning flag for democracy.

Unfortunately, even the worst parts of history tend to repeat themselves. Fortunately, "the arc of the moral universe is long, but it bends toward justice." (*Rev.Theodore Parker - popularized by Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.*)

Lord, hasten the bend and give us strength for the journey!

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



1st Cohort of Sacred Grounds Completed March 2023

Interfaith celebrates the completion of the first cohort of Sacred Grounds Pollinator Gardens. ICHDE was one of the community organizations that was recognized as an official Sacred Grounds site. Sacred Grounds sites work to address issues such as storm water management and engage communities around environmental stewardship.





It has been more than two years, since Hanover participated in the recognition of the first cohort of Sacred Grounds Pollinator Gardens. Sacred Grounds[™] is a National Wildlife Federation program that recognizes congregations, houses of worship, and faith communities that create wildlife habitat and actively link faith practices and caring for the environment. Pacem in Terris proposed a Peace Garden collaborative with Hanover Church and Jefferson Street Center. We received a Sacred Grounds mini-grant of \$1,000, for the creation of the Peace Garden pollinator project.

On June 16th Lindsey Walker of the National Wildlife Foundation and Sparrow Francis of Pennsylvania Interfaith Power & Light visited the 19th Street Sacred Grounds peace garden. They wanted to see an

example of a successful pollinator garden, as they begin to support a new cohort of organizations develop gardens. We have lots of flowers in bloom to support pollinators and the little chairs and library add to the peaceful environment on 19th Street. Many thanks to everyone who participated in making this Sacred Grounds garden a reality.
